

DE LAND TO PROBE AFFAIRS AT M. A. C.

Investigate the Charges That
County Agents Were Paid
to Spread School
Propaganda.

(By Associated Press.)
KIRKING, June 19.—Secretary of state Charles J. Clegg has been given the task by the state administration of investigating the charges of county farm agents with the Michigan State Farm Bureau, the state county agents, paid by the farm organization, have been used to spread propaganda affecting the management of the Michigan Agricultural college.
The assignment is a back fire from the recent controversy which raged around the action of the state board of agriculture, when it demanded the resignation of Dr. David Friday as president of M. A. C. At that time it was called to Governor Groves' attention by the Michigan State Farm Bureau. The governor received reports that they might have worked in the interests of the bureau against Dr. Friday, spreading dissatisfaction among the farmers. The governor came out in support of Dr. Friday and urged him not to offer his resignation. He reported that the M. A. C. for a report as to the source of pay for county agents. The report showed 29 of the agents received money from the farm bureau. According to college authorities, this is in compliance with the federal law—the remainder of the county agents from the state and the federal government.

The report was submitted without comment to the state administration. It was referred to secretary of land for further investigation. He will make a report back to the board, and it is rumored that it may be of a volatile nature. It is considered not probable that the governor will urge the board to withdraw from any arrangement which promises the partial payment of county agents by an outside organization.

The fiber resolution, urging consumers to use less sugar in order to force a price reduction, was killed in the assembly on Monday without debate and without a roll call. The resolution was introduced following a statement by Gov. Blaine, urging such a boycott. The assembly also killed the Miller bill which would have made county school superintendents elective by a county board of education, instead of a general election.
